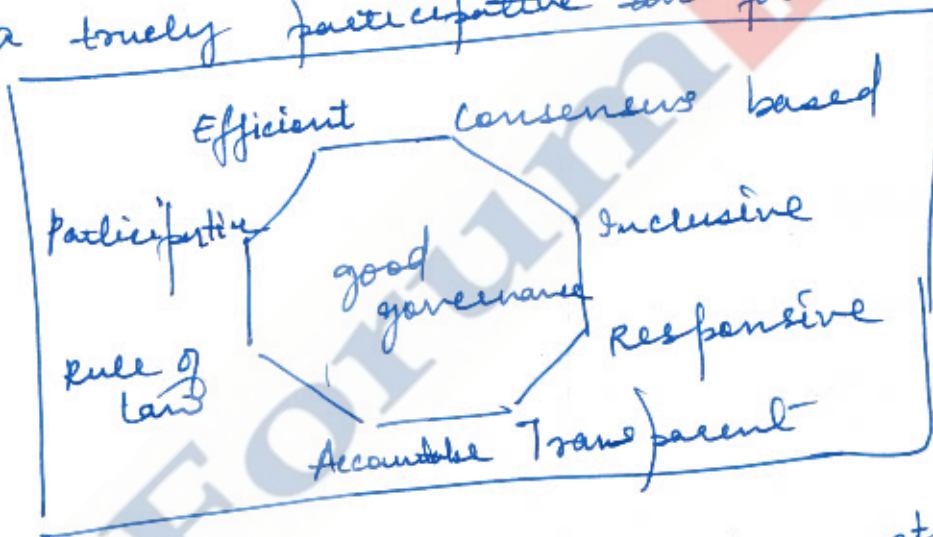

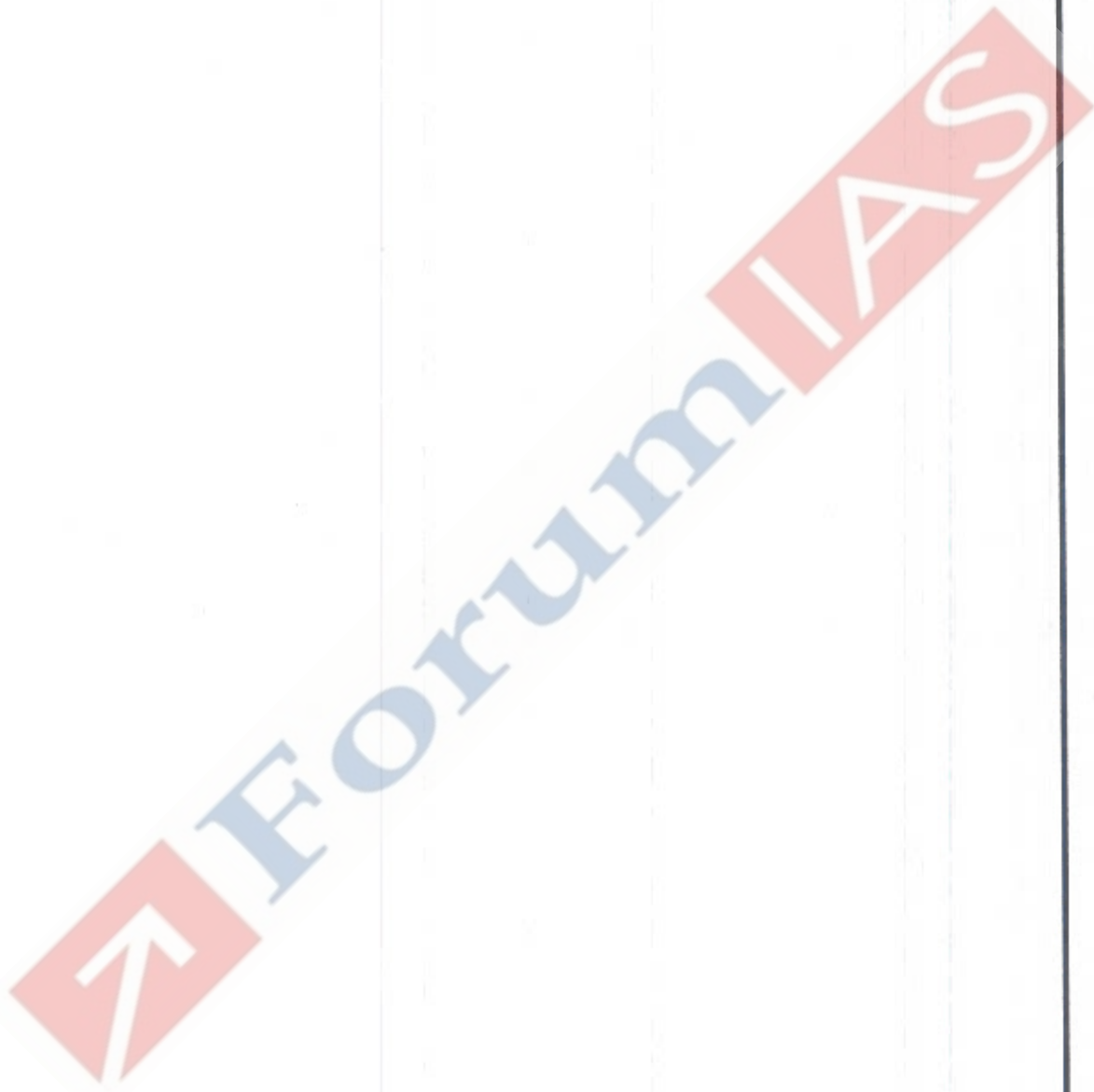

(ii) Helping a needy when no one is watching is an act of honesty ^{in conduct} which upholds integrity.

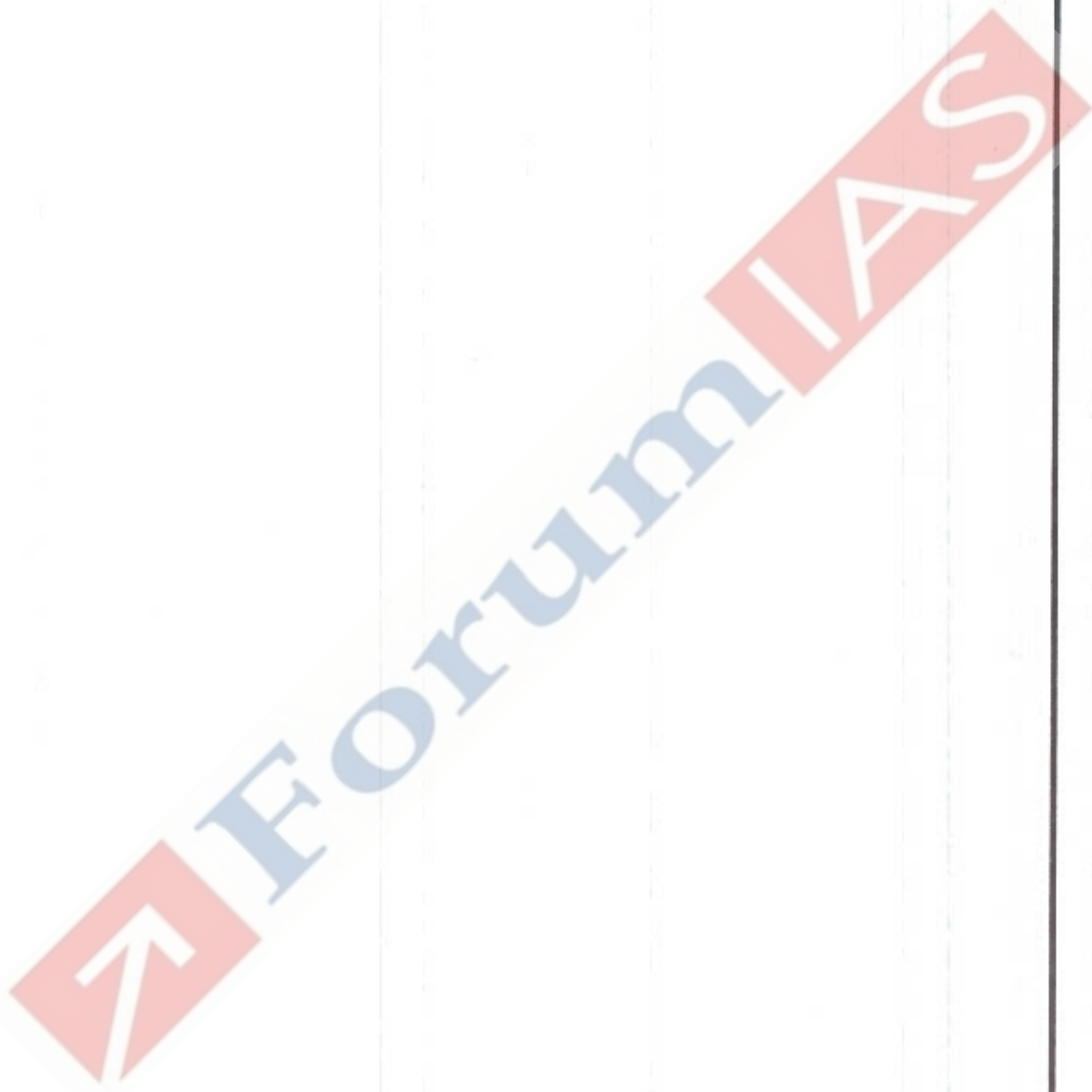

International aid is the aid given by inter-governmental bodies to countries to ensure growth and development. It can also be referred to aid and loans given by countries to each other.

1. International aid is often comes with prescribed standards in which it can be utilised. This

may not suit the receiving country.

Eg: structural adjustments necessary to be undertaken to get IMF bailout.

(doctrine of ministerial responsibility)
- (ii) to the democratic ethos like justice, equality, etc.

Public servants are considered as guardians of constitutional values, custodian of public funds and harbinger of change. This huge responsibility exposes them to various situations like

- political pressure
- frivolous charges
- Executive Accountability.
- Political Accountability.

To ensure honest public servants are guarded against any fake charges, transparency and legal mechanisms (Art 311, Art 310) are there.

Further when a civil servant is accountable he ensures good governance by increasing transparency, civil engagement, grievance redressal, responsive attitude. Hence Accountability in itself guards the civil servants by doctrine of anonymity.

For example:

- Compromising on integrity & principles leads to corruption (knowledge without integrity) for example Rajat Gupta indulging in insider trading. (Moderation of principles)

Contribution.

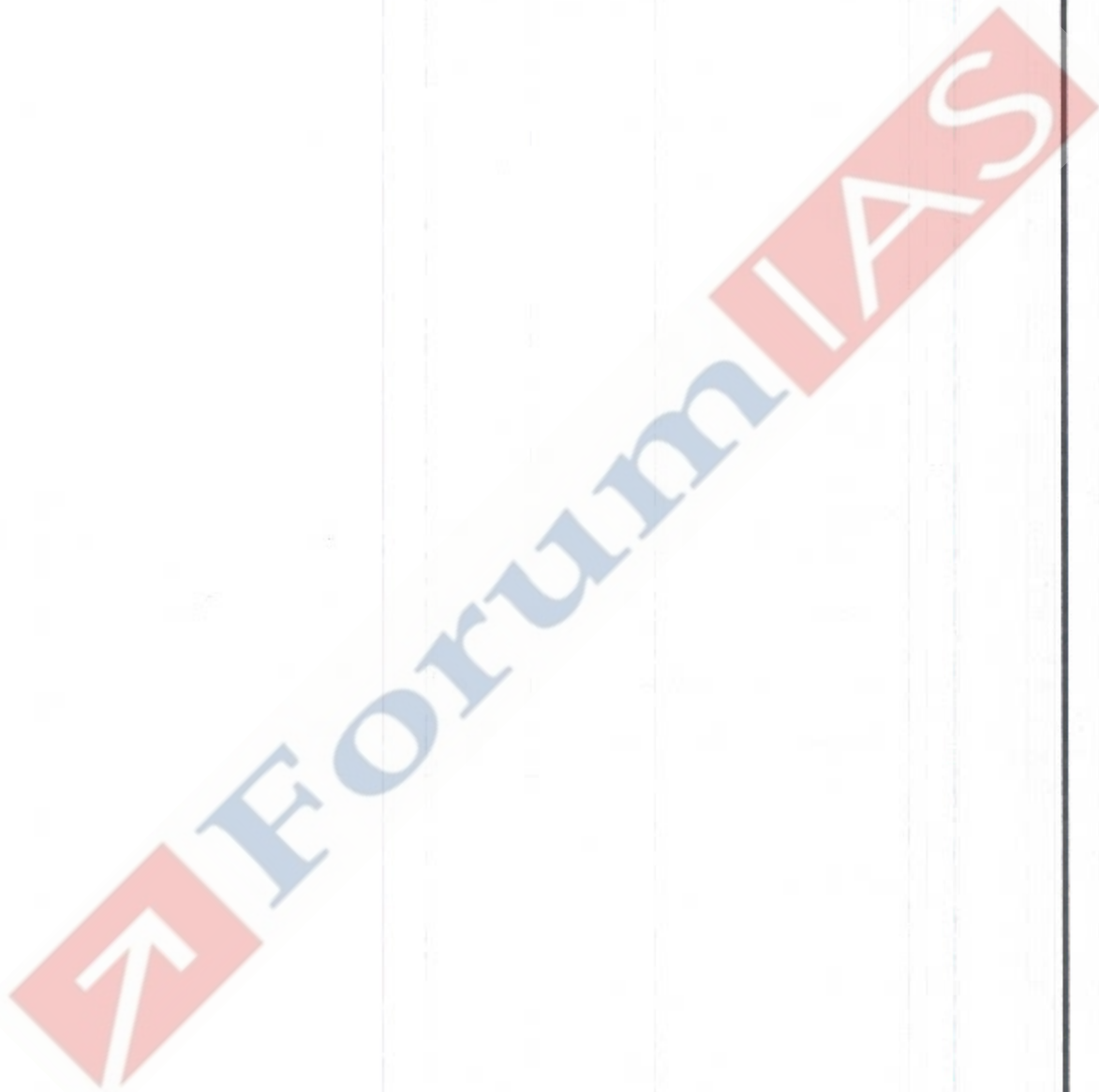
(1) Means justify the end

Artificial Intelligence is the Industrial Revolution 4.0. It is marked by use of Bigdata analytics, Machine learning etc

Ethical implication

1.) AI can efficiently do work of many labourers and hence deny right to work to large population. Example: Assembly lines, robots in restaurants, etc

(2) Can be coded to cause harm as it inherently lacks moral reasoning. Eg: use of malwares.

(3) AI can be used to breach data privacy and hence dignity of an individual can be

compromised.

However AI is the product of man's own intelligence. It can be put to various use like finding ~~new~~ cause for diseases, ~~new~~ medicines, doing jobs unfit for humans (Bandicoot instead of manual scavenger)

When a person practices ^{all} logic i.e. knowledge he may consider values sec-
-dary and even irrelevant. This will have repercussions for himself as well.

For eg: Pakistan uses its policy of state funded terrorism (logic to destabilise India). This had larger implications when Peshawar attacks took place (making the hand bleed)

Q.7) You are the Principal of a very reputed school in the city. One day after going through the attendance report of students, you found that a student of class 7 was continuously absent for more than 20 days. After enquiring from her class teacher and friends, you got to know that she is undergoing some fast. A similar case of a girl fasting for several days leading to her death surfaced in the media reports a year back.

You are very much worried about the child. You, along with the class teacher tried to meet the parents and relatives of the child. According to her parents, the fasting was voluntary and this was not the first time she had taken up fasting. However, few neighbors allege that the fast was done for family pride and good fortune in business as their business has suffered losses.

In the above context answer the following:

- What are the ethical issues involved in this case
- Should the individual be given "right to die" or is it a social evil and hence should be rejected?
- What are the options available to you and what course of action would you take? Justify with reasons? (20 Marks, 250 Words)

(a) ETHICAL ISSUES INVOLVED

(i) Societal morality as her parents say the fast is voluntary. It becomes their own norm to practice their customs. However it might have adverse affect on the health of the child.

(ii) My duty as the Principal is to ensure wellbeing of my students. But the issue is that do I get the right to interfere in their

personal and family matters as well.

(b)

Right to die

Right to life is a fundamental right under Art 21 of the Constitution. It is a natural right endowed to a person by means of being a human.

The debate that Right to life in itself includes right to die specially with 'dignity' started with the legal debate of passive Euthanasia.

'Right to die' can be granted as per SC judgement by practising ^{good} Active Passive Euthanasia as a life

It includes a dignified death as well.

However the fallout of right to

Die can be its practice as a social evil. It can be misused to force the weaker sections (women/widow/etc) to die forcefully.

Thus it needs to be practiced with prudence and as per SC judgement.

(C). OPTIONS AVAILABLE

- (1) Shut a blind eye to whatever is happening and not interfere. ~~in~~
- (2) Uphold the role of a 'mentor' and 'guide' as the Principal and ensure the well being of student.

Course of Action

- (1) I would be proactive and take steps to ensure the well being of the student.
- (2) As the Principal of school, I would exercise my authority and meet

the student and her parents to clarify situation.

(3) I would ~~not~~ try to persuade the parents about how such fasts are derogative for their child's personal and physical health.

(4) Further, if they still persists, I would take help of 'child welfare NGOs' and at last take legal actions.

(5) Lastly to ensure such practices don't continue in future, I would organise a drive for both parents and students to spread awareness. (Wisdom & prudence)

As a Principal, I need to realise that the socialization process begins at school and it is important to set a morally right example were societal evils don't spread its fangs. (duty of a teacher).

Stand

I will not let the privacy and data of customers to be compromised, and hence will ensure that the product is not launched till all technical issues are resolved.

→ It will act with 'fortitude' and try to make my boss understand that the issue can lead to huge compromises on part of data.

- Further, I would talk to the seniors and board by raising a ticket. This will ~~require~~ ensure higher ups ~~are~~ to know about the issue and stop the launch.
- Once the launch is stopped, I would ask to the seniors (acting in pondence) to let me help in resolution. I may even lead the team if they allow me to.
- I would make them aware that any such launch of a product will also hamper company's image and is breach of public trust.

Justification

There is need to ensure that the company's Ethos of serving the customers are upheld. As an employee it is my professional integrity and as a citizen my

personal integrity compels me to stand for what is ethically and legally right.

(4) ETHICAL CONCERNS

(1) Use of public data must not breach dignity of any individual.

(2) Right to privacy (Art 21 & Puttaswamy judgement) is another ethical concern in dealing with public data.

SC in Aadhar judgement remarked that privacy is secondary to common welfare.

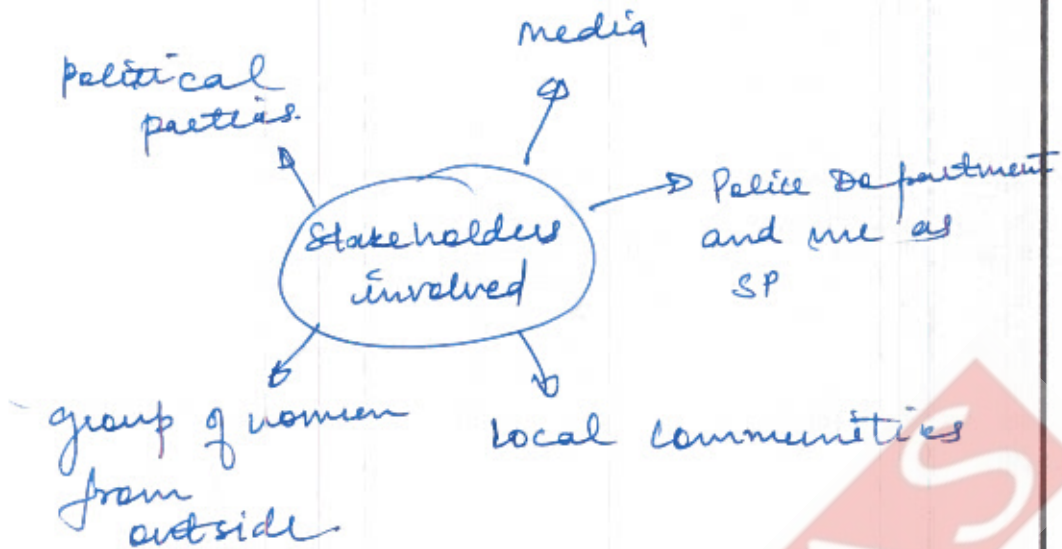

Cause of Actions

(a) The above case highlights the issue of means vs Ends. As the founder of the company

- It is my duty to ensure I run a profitable business
- Employment of my workers isn't jeopardised
- Expand my business

However, any investment from illegal means to ensure the above ends (of expanding my business) is against by Professional Ethics of Business.

My stand

Though the company is in dire need of investment, I would not allow illegal and moral money to be invested in.

Reasons

1. Means should justify the end. (deontological argument).
2. I would set a bad precedence for my employees if illegal money is invested in my business. Moral Assectiveness requires me to do what is right.

(b) Any wealth amassed by illegal means is essentially unethical practices as well. It is more often the result of 'collusive corruption', money laundering, trafficking, etc.

Such practices at large are detrimental to society's well being. They compromise on rights of the poor and marginalised, and deny the rightful wage to many others.

These practices are also against market and democratic ethos of justice, equality, fairness.

Thus any such wealth that is immorally acquired cannot be justified for the use of any purpose be it charity and poor.

(a) As the only authoritative person to comment on the facts of the events I would ~~for~~ :-

support their cause

This is important because a prejudice trial can lead to denial of justice which would defeat its cause.

Explanation

- As a public officer, it is my duty to ensure law is upheld even after retirement (Probability)

- (2) Any prejudiced and mismanaged facts can lead to further disillusionment amongst the public regarding the police force. Thus there should be a review of the film to ensure reality is portrayed and no dramatization of facts is done.

ETHICAL ISSUES

- (1) Probity of office

A biopic hailing an ACP as hero in an intensely charged situation can question the probity of office and actions of the officer.

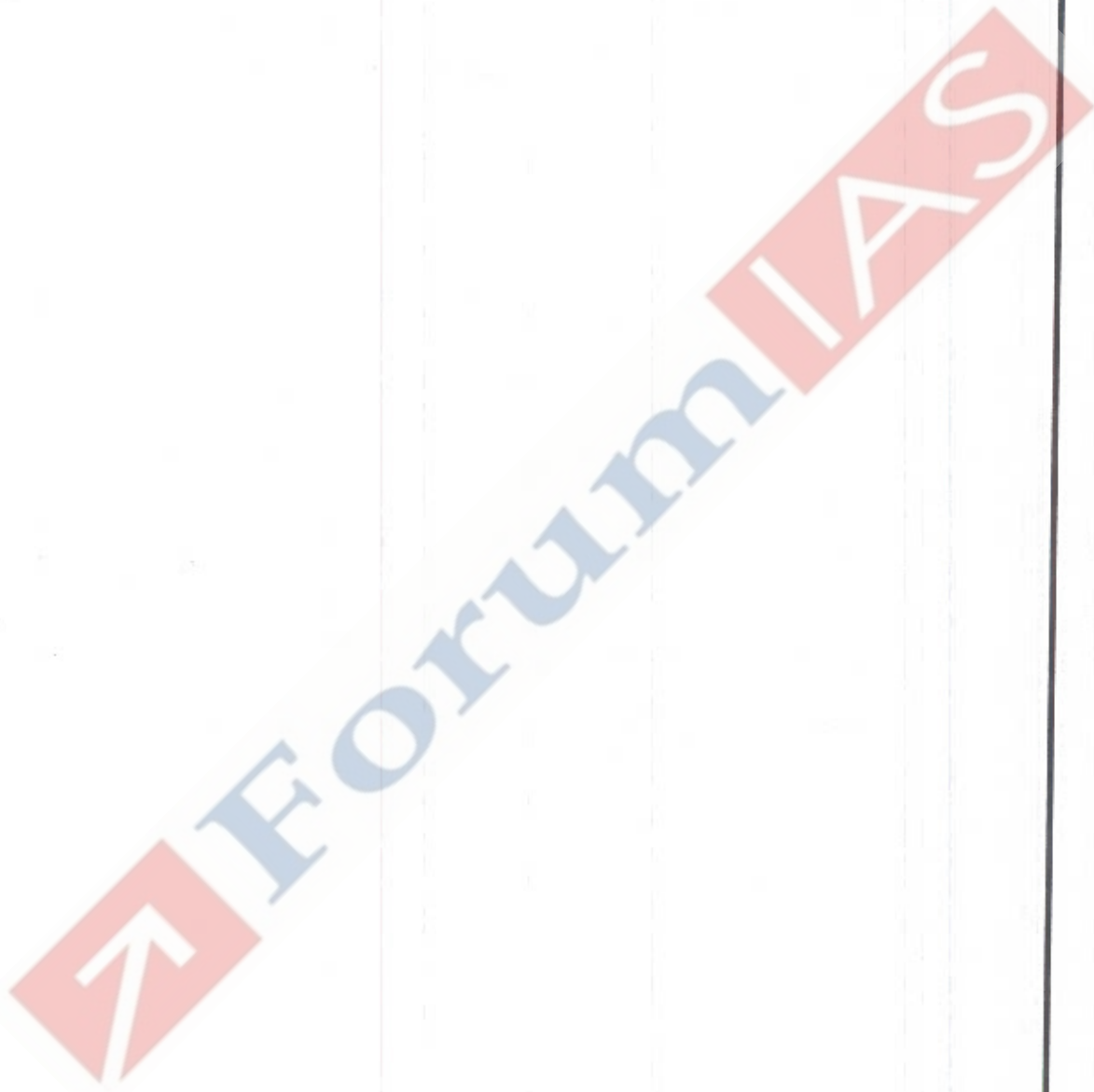
- (2) Depicting locals as terrorists can hurt the sentiments of the people.
