Ashvathama, the son of Guru Dranacharya, vowed to avenge the defeat of Kauravas and used the divine weapon "Brahmastra" to kill the fetus in the womb of Uttara. This would have ensured an end of the lineage of the Kuru clan.

This story signifies why it is important to think multi-dimensionally and learn various ways to handle different results arising out of our action.

In this essay, we will explore the importance of evolution of thoughts while dealing with problems arising due to human actions.

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Key patriarchal values drove the process of misery of females as well as the environment.

The process of industrialisation and urbanisation led to massive deforestation and carbon emission for maximising resource utilisation.

However, it led to unintended consequences in the form of climate change and extreme exploitation of natural resources.

Today we cannot follow a simple linear model of thought to reverse the damage caused. We cannot deny the underdeveloped nations of Global South from realising

their potential of economic growth.

The solution lies in the "Doughnut Economics" of Kate Raworth. It explains that the ideal and just society lies between the social foundation and ecological ceiling. Hence, it is necessary to maintain the equilibrium between human and ecological balance.

"Thinking is like a game, it doesn't begin without the opposite team".

The strategy should be dynamic so as to accommodate the various results that were not accounted for. We must always be

flexible in our approach to successfully minimise the harms arising out of human actions.

During the inter-war period, various autocratic regime emerged in Europe such as Hitler in Germany and Mussolini in Italy. Their rule possessed threat to human rights.

The threats were countered by the democracies in the world through collaboration and awareness among the people. However, the nuclear threat emerged as a serious threat to the mere existence of humanity.

Today, as the world suffers

from global polycrisis in middle East and Ukraine, the nuclear threat has worsened the situation.

Can the development of nuclear arms by all the major countries be the solution to deter nuclear threat? It would instead add to the crisis as even the simplest conflict could threaten nuclear attack.

The present situation demands credibility and accountability from the world leaders. They must move towards gradual solving of conflicts via diplomacy and engagement.

Violence must be countered via peace talks. Gandhiji's idea of "Satyagraha" is the torchbearer to confront the exploiter. An eye for an eye will lead to destruction and nothing else.

Similarly, most of the global organisations which were formed post World War II, are not reflective of the current global order. This possesses a threat to equity and inclusivity.

It doesn't mean they should be scrapped. The solution lies not in building new institutions, rather reforming the existing one. This would ensure continuity and stability.

Similarly, there is a need for bringing structural changes in the economy for solving issues of inflation, unemployment etc. An economy cannot follow the same path and model of growth across time.

In post-independence phase, India saw a transition from excessive public control to gradual liberalisation, privatisation and globalisation (LPG). Today, as the world experiences wave of protectionism, India must think in such way that ensures its strategic autonomy.

However, sometimes our problems can be solved by thinking in the same way as it led to creation of them.

The field of research and innovation relies on observing the nature to solve our problems via biotechnology. Thus, humans who exploited the resources, now rely on nature to find an efficient solution.

Reverse engineering can be applied for developing an antidote for various biological threats.

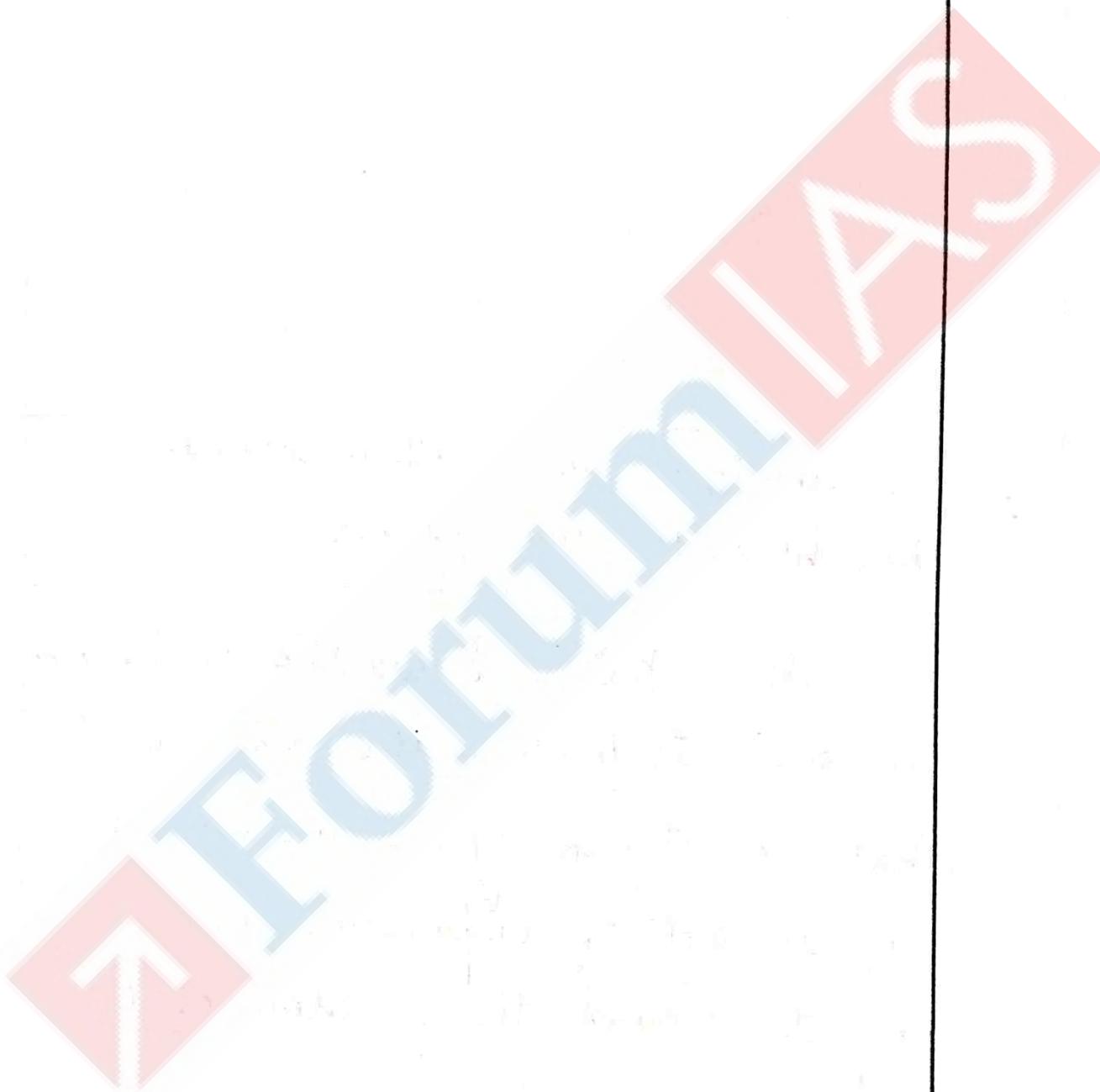
Similarly, too much of radical thinking can produce even worse results. As the globe progresses, countries have shifted focus towards
