Q2. Answer all of the following questions :

- (a) How does the myth of Leda's rape in Yeats's "Leda and the Swan" symbolize the social milieu of early twentieth-century Europe ? 15
- (b) How does T.S. Eliot's "Journey of the Magi" explore the themes of alienation, regret and powerlessness ? 15
- (c) Analyse how A.K. Ramanujan's poems depict the negotiation between heritage and modernity in the formation of postcolonial identity. 20

Q3. Answer all of the following questions :

- (a) Assess how far W.H. Auden's assertion that "Poetry makes nothing happen" is true. 15
- (b) Discuss Philip Larkin's statement that "deprivation is for me what daffodils were for William Wordsworth", with reference to his poetic vision. 15
- (c) What structural and formal innovations characterised modernist poetry ? Illustrate with reference to the prescribed poems. 20

Q4. Answer all of the following questions :

- (a) To what extent does the revolutionary impact of *Look Back in Anger* lie, not only in its themes, but also in its language and dramatic expression ? 15
- (b) Discuss how *Waiting for Godot* by Samuel Beckett represents a convergence between avant-garde and popular culture. 15
- (c) Discuss the use of existential themes, circular dialogues, and illogical situations in absurd drama. 20

SECTION B

Q5. Answer all of the following questions in about 150 words each : 10×5=50

- (a) Analyse the ways in which Joseph Conrad's *Lord Jim* addresses the ideological and moral consequences of colonialism and racism. 10
- (b) Elaborate how guilt, sin and confession contribute to Stephen's moral and psychological development in James Joyce's *A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man*. 10
- (c) Examine the characters in *Sons and Lovers* from a psychoanalytical perspective. 10
- (d) Analyse how E.M. Forster employs the tripartite structure in *A Passage to India* to explore the limits of cross-cultural understanding. 10
- (e) Examine *Mrs. Dalloway* as a novel that explores its deepest concerns through the themes of medicine, empire, and love. 10

Q6. Answer all of the following questions :

- (a) Analyse the role of oral narrative style and mythic framework in shaping the structure of *Kanthapura*. 15
- (b) Explore V.S. Naipaul's use of comic situations and satiric characterisation in *A House for Mr. Biswas*. 15
- (c) Examine the features and significance of the stream of consciousness technique in modernist literature with reference to *Mrs. Dalloway*. 20

Q7. Answer all of the following questions :

- (a) Discuss how Joseph Conrad explores the complex issues of honour, guilt and heroism in his novel *Lord Jim*. 15
- (b) Analyse the significance of the ending of *A Passage to India* in terms of colonial separation and the politics of desire. 15
- (c) Examine how *Kanthapura* portrays poverty, illiteracy, and superstition. 20

Q8. Answer all of the following questions :

- (a) Examine how V.S. Naipaul uses the physical and social landscape in *A House for Mr. Biswas* to mirror the struggles, aspirations, and isolation of Mr. Biswas. 15
- (b) Discuss the representation of colliery life in D.H. Lawrence's *Sons and Lovers*. 15
- (c) Discuss the interplay between Stephen's personal experiences and his emerging ideas about the role of the artist in society. 20
